


MARQUE TIME



BROKEN SPRING ON INGITION SWITCH... DANG

I just experienced some very serious problems on my 65B due to a broken return spring on the ignition switch. I was driving home and heard a strange noise. I stopped because I thought a stick was dragging underneath the car. I checked and continued on my trip home and heard the noise again. I was close so I went home. I smelled electrical burning and thought the generator had finally given out. I tried to start the car and all I heard was a wiz, wiz and the engine did not turn over. I removed the starter and found that all the teeth on the starter gear and on the flywheel ring gear were ground down to a nub. Apparently the ignition switch had stayed in the start position and continued to run while I was driving.....I was bummed out. The guys in the Williamsburg British Car club helped me pull the engine and get everything back together. I appreciate all of their help and encouragement. I had to replace the ring gear on the flywheel and buy a new starter. I also bought a new clutch kit and ignition switch. All I had to do was look at the key and return it to the run position and I would have avoided all these problems and expenses.....SHOULD HAVE!!!!


I got everything back together and was filling the radiator and it started leaking. I have never had a leak but upon checking I had to buy a new radiator. I then installed my new ignition switch and wasted about four hours trying to get it to work. My old switch was a three position switch and the Moss replacement switch is a four position switch (old switch is NA in catalog). I called Moss and found out that +12V is connected to switch position #1 not #3 per all MGB wiring diagrams. I also discovered that the solenoid red and white lead connects to switch position #4 not to #1 per the MGB wiring diagram. I then installed my new hi-torque starter from Brit-tek and I got it in but it fit very tightly against the body of the car. When I got everything finished and started the car it was shaking a whole lot. The starter was transferring the engine vibrations to the car body. Now I have ordered a new Moss Hi-Torque starter and sent the Brit-tek starter back for a refund, Brit-tek said that no one has ever sent one back for this reason...go figure. The Moss starter is about 1/4" smaller from the mounting hole to the edge of the starter. I am awaiting the new starter and hope everything works OK......WHEW.

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SPRINGS ARE HERE

(or 'We Don't Need No Stinkin' New Springs', By Don Gatheman

Well, a few years ago, like about seven, John Mangles replaced the clutch on my 1970 Midget. When I picked it up from his shop, he mentioned I had a broken leaf in one of my rear springs. I figured I'd get around to it sometime- this December I finally did!

So, I had several possible plans of attack. The first was to just buy new springs, but I keep reading about the poor fit of after market leaf springs for Midgets and Bs; usually resulting in the rear end of the car sitting up way too high. I thought a pair of originals might be better, and as luck would have it, three years ago I purchased a parts car and kept the springs from it. I figured I'd replace the pair to keep them as a matched set. When I finally got around to pulling them from the garage shelf, I noticed one of the springs had a broken leaf- the exact leaf that was broken on my car! A new plan formed in my brain...



I took the broken replacement spring to my workbench. I thought I'd see how hard it would be to take the leaves apart- it was actually very easy! After soaking the middle bolt holding the leaves together in WD-40 and oil, the bolt came out, and so did the leaves. The next problem was what to do for the needed replacement



leaf. I had two options: take apart the "good" spare spring and use the appropriate leaf, or use a longer leaf and cut it down. Curiosity made me choose the second option.

The next decision of course was getting it on the car. Since the spare came apart easily, I figured the one on the car would too. In this case, it was actually true-I jacked up the car, took off the wheel, disconnected the shock, and things came apart easily. I took out the affected leaf, cut the donor leaf to size, and put everything back. The biggest problem was to ensure lining up the bolts and putting the leaf brackets back on. Rather than describe in detail, I'll let the pictures do the rest.

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
