Touring Tips

Since we did most of the TMGC tours last year, and have a bit of experience on other tours, we decided to share a few ideas to make touring in groups a little more enjoyable -- and less stressful for the navigator.

- Keep the car behind you in your rear view mirror! That
 way no one gets left behind. Don't worry about keeping up
 with the car in front, it will be slowing down to keep you in
 sight. If necessary, the leader will pull over in a safe spot
 and wait.
- 2. Leave enough room between cars so modern iron can pass safely (on a 2-lane road) or merge from a ramp.
- 3. If you pull over show thumbs up if you don't need help, thumbs down if you want us to stop. If this doesn't happen where all the cars can pull over safely, all but one or 2 can motor on to a safe place and pull over. Keep the leader informed.
- 4. Load phone numbers into your phone's contacts ahead of time, and be sure to put the area code in for when we are out of town. Give the leader your cell number.
- 5. Enjoy the trip!

Donald Ladd joined us at the Hardees in Great Bridge for an early run up Rt 460 to raid their parts warehouse and take a look at some of the great cars we heard were now displayed in their showroom. Frank Linse was with us is spirit as we had an order for him to take along.

The weatherman was right on as it began raining heavily as soon as we hit 460. We drove modern, partly to have room in the van for parts coming home, and partly because we didn't want to endure the cold, wet weather in the MGB.



As we pulled into Moss it was obvious there were a lot of others who did the same thing. But wait – Donald was ushered into the back where he had a nice dry indoor spot inside the warehouse. Still, there were only a handful of cars including a Jag XKE, a couple of newer Jags and a nice 74 MGBGT that is a regular driver.

The coffee and donuts were welcome, and the tour of the facility began right on time. Again, we were impressed with their efficiency and how really involved with the car hobby they are.
