TMGCC Meeting Minutes 11/4/2015 (recorded by Bruce Easley)

The illustrious group of British Car owners convened at the lovely home of Bob Vann, and after some carogling and libation, the meeting was kicked off right on time by the NEW Vice President (and Activities Director) Tad Carter. Our new Prez, Robert Perrone, had better things to do, such as a son's orchestra concert, so he "blew us off" for the evening, leaving the meeting on Tad's broad shoulders.

Tad asked if any guests or new members were present, and it was found there were none. He reminded the assemblage to keep Rose and Donald Ladd, as well as Stephen Daniel, as they are experiencing health issues; Don may need knee surgery.



Business reports: Our Treasurer, Jim Villers, reported that after income from dues and regalia and disbursements for Tech Session, meeting support, and Dipstick issue expenses, we have a positive balance of \$2,430.22. Membership Chairman Bill Yoshida reported no change since the last meeting; we have 117 paid memberships, representing 183 cars. He noted that a digital copy of the 2016 Directory was sent to each member with a valid email address in September, and paper copies were available at the club meeting or had been mailed to those people not attending the meeting. A big "THANK YOU" to the team of Bill Yoshida and Jim

Villers for tackling this effort yet again. Mark Davidoski asked for volunteers to submit write-ups for upcoming club activities, including the upcoming Lynchburg/ Car Collection drive, and several commitments were made. The October meeting minutes were offered for comment and approved as written.

Tad then updated us on activities, thanking Terry and Sue Bond for hosting the most recent Tech Session at

their estate. He reported that 15 cars will be making the upcoming Lynchburg drive, and that good winery and food stops are included in the trip. Thanks to Bill Cochran for the suggestion for this trip. Our annual Holiday Party will be at the Villers' on Dec. 11, and our annual Christmas Lights drive through Norfolk Botanical Gardens will be Dec. 15. Tad had suggestions for Party Pot Luck provisions, and for support for the Samaritan House this year. Also, please contact Tad with a head count to be able to give Franco's restaurant an estimate of how many people to expect at the Lights drive dinner. There is an opening to host the March meeting, and Tad is looking for an alternate meeting date in July.



Technical/ Marque Tyme comments: Members reported on work done at "American Stripper" in Norfolk, which does sandblasting, powder coating, etc. Ask Andy Wallach for information. Terry Bond had found 1935 Morris 8 sedan "remnants" that may be available, as well as a '69 B roadster. Jim Villers described his learning process of installing heated steel rivets using an air chisel and acetylene torch, with amazingly strong and tight results.

No raffle or regalia prizes were awarded at this meeting, and the group adjourned for more food, libation, and the usual info swapping.

Tuddie and the Tech Session(from Andy Wallach)

While the Club normally manages to leave one of our entrusted MGs at the site of a tech session, the good news is that this time more cars drove away than drove to the Bond Chicken and Sparkplug Ranch. Most of the drama revolved around Tuddie, Cynthia's (my wife's) TD.

The drama actually started on Friday, two days before the tech session. While driving Tuddie to the November meeting at the Olcheski's, I noticed several minor ailments. (Let's remember...all MG ailments are minor that do not prevent forward motion or stopping). So I was eagerly anticipating working on these minor items. So to be sure that I was ready to go, I attempted to start Tuddie. Well no joy. Cranked over fine but no ignition. Previously Frank Linse had helped me with an ignition problem which rectified itself when we tried a different coil and stayed rectified when put the old coil back in. So I thought I probably had some sort of no-spark condition. Anyway, based on my experience time can heal some problems, I figured I would try again on Saturday to start the beast. Well, on Saturday, after cranking it over many times, cleaning some oil out of the distributor (as we know MGs like to dispense oil everywhere), the electrical system goes dead. No ignition light. Fiddle with the battery terminals, the ignition light comes back on, pull the starter cable, hear a "cheack", and all is dead again. Well, maybe my battery terminal connections are not tight enough. The T series had what is called a helmet connector which goes over the terminal and has a screw which goes down through the helmet and into the terminal vice the more modern clamp-type connector. I try for visual originality, so I had helmet connectors. So up to my parts department (the second floor of my garage), and the subsequent installation of a clamp-type connector. Ignition light, pull the starter, and "cheack". Hook up my battery charger-starter to give this battery more umph, pull the starter, hear the starter spin but it doesn't throw out the pinion (the gear that engages the flywheel and turns the engine, and "cheack". Then try the charger on "charge" and get no reading. Battery will not charge. Bad battery?

Why do I have these frustrating cars? Here I was going to get a bunch of minor things fixed and the car won't even start to get me to the tech session. I was bummed out. Then enlightenment, I have a truck, I have a special TD/TF

tow bar, I can tow this beast and let my fellow Club masochists figure out what's wrong.

So Sunday morning, I remove Tuddie's front bumper, bolt on the tow bar, hook it to the truck, and accompanied by my son Josh and grandson Evan, three MGeers head forth for the Ranch. Alls well but doesn't end well. As we turn onto Hillwell Rd, the tow bar pops off the trucks ball. I slowly stop as Tuddie bounces off the trucks bumper. Well being in the middle of the road, I ignore any damage and put the tow bar back on the hitch and start up. Something's wrong; stop, one of the bolts attaching the towbar to the TD has pulled out. Disconnect the towbar. Push the TD off the road? No. Behind us is Russ Ripp with a tow rope. Around the front cross member and over the tow hitch ball and off we go with

me in the TD and Josh driving the truck. I am riding the brakes to ensure no more bouncing off of trucks.

Well assessing the damage...one front fender major denting, other front fender minor denting. No use worrying about the damage; lets get this car operating. We try a booster pack, we try a charger, we check with a voltmeter, we go to Advance Auto and get a new battery. While battery assessing, Frank Linse notices that the intake manifold is loose. Loose manifold, pull in pure air, not air-gas mixture through the carburetors, car not start because not enough gas for ignition? Tighten three manifold bolts. What about the fourth...cannot tighten what is not there. Hopefully three will make the manifold tight enough.

Hook up battery. Car starts instantly when I pull on the starter cable. So loose manifold, then bad battery, then dented fenders. Oh well, lets now attack the minor ailment list. Choke cable very hard to pull. Craig Cummings helps me shorten the cable but still it is hard to pull. Notice that the fuel line that goes from one carb to the other carb rests on the carb linkage. Maybe this is causing the tightness. Stretch the fuel line a little by turning the carb float chamber cover. Well, now the fuel line leaks. The Ts have rubber fuel lines covered with a flexible metal weave. After wasting time trying to fix the fuel line; cut off the ends, and, after back to Advance Auto for new rubber tubing and clamps, a reconstructed line, routed over the intake manifold (so does not interfere with the choking, and no leaks.

So the minor ailment list was reduced by one: a hard-pulling choke cable. When's the next tech session?

Drove Tuddie home followed by Josh and Evan in the truck. Car ran fine. Evan runs into the house and tells Nonna (Cynthia) that he has some good news and some bad news. He tells her the good news that Tuddie is running fine and then turns to me to announce the bad news: Tuddie has some new dimples.

Thanks to Sue and Terry Bond for hosting another fine MG function. Thanks also to Terry for providing the first item in Evan's spark plug collection.

Lynchburg Drive - Day One

Just when we thought our driving season was over, Tad came through for us and arranged a great weekend getaway in our MGs. A leisurely drive westward over lightly travelled roads, a winery stop (of course!) and viewing a car collection in Lynchburg, with an overnight stay in the historic district was the plan, returning on Sunday after stopping at Appomattox Courthouse. Even a little rain on Saturday didn't dampen our spirits, although a couple of MGs got a little wet inside, along with the some shoes and socks! Thanks to member Bill Cochran for arranging a visit to the private car collection of Mark J. Smith, a collector car enthusiast and dealer who he bought his MGA from earlier.

Our group of nine MGs and one Toyota support vehicle left the Waffle House on Portsmouth Blvd at exactly 8:02 AM as Tad predicted, according to the clock in my MGB. We made a relaxed drive up Rt. 460 to Waverly to meet up with Bob & Missy McKenna at the McDonalds, and from there headed west on Rt. 40. Route 40 is one of those old two—lane roads that traverses the state and is a great alternative to busier roads, if you're not in a hurry to get somewhere. After crossing I-95, we ran into a light mist, and by the time we crossed over I-85, the mist had turned into a steady, light rain. Thankfully it wasn't as bad as some of the weather forecasters had predicted, and basically ended when we got on Rt. 460 again east of Blackstone, with only a light shower or two the rest of the afternoon. After a pit-stop in Crewe for gas and the loo, we were soon heading down Rt. 360, where we got off at the Keysville exit to pick up Rt. 40 again, heading for our first stop, Sans Soucy Vineyards for a wine tasting and lunch.

Sans Soucy was one of our stops on a previous winery tour and we all enjoyed it. Denise and I had also stopped by there this past August while visiting family nearby. The owner is very entertaining, not only with describing the various wines they produce, but also talking about some of his many adventures during his career as a Marine Corps officer. Lunch consisted of a salad and cheese and crackers provided by Tad and others, along with wood-fired pizzas purchased at the winery. While we all enjoyed the wine and food and would have liked to have spent more time there, we had to an appointment at 1400 to view the car collection, so back in the MGs we went.

Taking more back roads until we got to Lynchburg, our destination was an old bottling company building in the historic riverfront area. Here we met up with Mark Smith to view his collection of mostly British cars in this location. Yes, he has several locations of cars! From MG TCs to MGBs, with a couple of Austin Healeys, Jaguars, a Rolls Royce, and even a couple of Italians thrown into the mix, it was quite the collection. A smattering of engines, race cars and other old automobilia added to the eclectic mix. After spending an hour or so there, we headed to his other collection several blocks away, housed in an old car dealership in a historic building dating back to 1899. Some of us discovered this collection several years ago on the Winery Tour to Lynchburg, but we were only able to peer through the windows at the time. What a great collection of American automotive history this is, spanning the early 1900's to the mid-1950's, with a lot of automobile memorabilia on display as well! The main showroom displayed a couple of mid-50's Fords and Mercury's, along with an Austin America and three very early cars from 1907, including a Packard, a Ford, and a White. All RHD! In the large back room there were a few more Fords, along with Packards, Studebakers, a DeSoto taxi cab from the movie "It's a Wonderful Life", and many other interesting, eclectic cars and memorabilia. In the basement was a huge treasure trove of Ford Model T's. Although we all admired what we saw down there, only Terry Bond could truly appreciate the magnitude of it all. Terry even pointed out a Model N along the back wall, a predecessor to the Model T. After a couple of hours it was time for us all to leave and close up the candy store!

Our accommodations for the evening were at the Holiday Inn Downtown, which even had covered parking for our MGs. A good meal was had at the {RA} Bistro, including liquid libations and lively conversation. Even Bernie Imdahl and friend were there to join us. A great way to cap an enjoyable MG day.

Lynchburg – Part 2 (fromTerry Bond)

The chance to sleep in on Sunday was welcome. A few early AM risers ventured out for a self-guided walking-tour of the downtown area, and somehow managed to climb the steps of Monument Terrace to the Courthouse to enjoy the spectacular view. The homeless man was astounded. "Won't your wife be furious with you for doing that?"

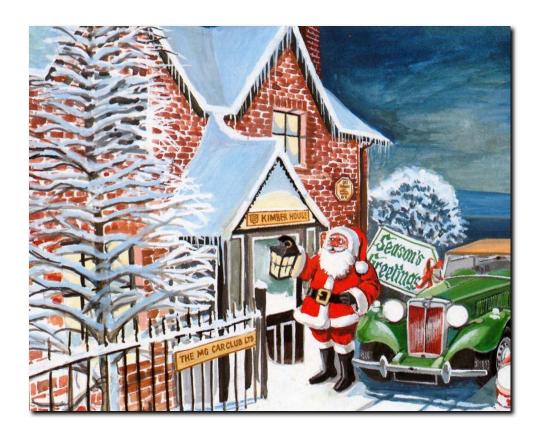
The man replied, "That's okay. It's important for her to see what happens to a man after he has given up drinking and restoring old cars."

TECH TIP

Fitting a new master cylinder to a MGB

Two weeks ago I decided to fit a new master cylinder to my 74 MGB. Although this is not a difficult job, it does involve time and working with old pipe work that may need tender care. After fitting the new cylinder, I then tried to bleed the brakes and found I could not get any fluid from the back brake cylinders. I then went to the new master cylinder, removed the pipe to the back brakes, and could not get any fluid from the new cylinder. Since I live only an hour away from Moss parts, I took the cylinder back for replacement. However, in the trunk of my car I had with me an aluminum pan, some brake fluid, and some old rags to test the replacement cylinder before I left.

My tip is, if you are going to replace the master cylinder, put the new one in the vice and put a drop of fluid in the front and back areas of the reservoir, and test it. It will save you a lot of time and work if the new one turns out to be bad.
