


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November 2016



Our intrepid crew left the Galax Hampton Inn at 09:00 sharp, under low clouds and a drizzly morning. There were many tops up, except for a few hardy "amphibious" souls. Our first order of business was to push Don's B to get it started, due to an electrical malfunction; thanks to Tad, Mike, and Russ! We get by with a little help from our friends. Next, a gas stop and final meet-up and we were off.

Due to poor interaction between MapQuest and GPS, we had the wonderful opportunity to see a few roads twice (U-turns), which allowed us to enjoy some of the great rolling hills and get some good road pictures. We rolled into the Beagle Ridge Herb Farm and Environmental Education Center about 10:30 and got to tour the herb garden and shop while we waited for the slide show and lunch. Beagle Ridge is a Certified Wildlife Habitat, operated by a Master Naturalist. Their specialty is raising lavender, monarch butterflies, and the milkweed plant on which they lay their eggs. The slide show explained the life cycle of the monarch butterfly, their long-distance migration pattern, and the tagging program established through the University of Kansas. Our pre-ordered lunch was very tasty, and included lavender cake with lavender glaze. Unusual treat!

After lunch, several MGers assisted in the tagging and release of male and female butterflies. Andy and Cynthia took the first turn, with most of the group joining in. Be sure to see the great pictures on the website. This was a great experience in a beautiful place. The only down side was the loooning (3.5 mi) gravel drive to the Farm, which left most of the MGs coated in dust – enough to send several drivers to the car wash in Floyd later.

Our drive to the Foggy Ridge Cidery was beautiful, and during the tour of fantastic winding roads and rolling hills we passed Beaverdam Road and Al's Nest (Al Hazlett was with the group). At Foggy Ridge we were educated in the production of various types of cider. The award-winning cidery produces about 6 types, which range in alcohol content from 7 to 18%. Tannin and acidity control is important in making cider, and the cidery specializes in producing a type that has effervescence not unlike champagne.

After more MG-class roads (notice the S-shape on the road signs), we arrived in Floyd and checked in at the beautiful Hotel Floyd. We had a few hours to enjoy the scenery, shops, and brew offerings in town, and were lucky to find that the local Fire Department was holding a benefit with live music in a valley glade in town. Dinner and dancing at the Dogtown Roadhouse was great, with music by the Get Right band. There was a great selection of brew offerings, with their Get Bent IPA on draft really hitting the spot. Back at the Hotel, Rose Ladd put got the group together with some great snacks and conversation before it was off to dreamland and the anticipation of another excellent day on the Road.

As we began to once again approach civilization, we rounded a turn in the small community of Fieldale, and there on a corner was a faithfully recreated 1930's gas station. For a moment I felt like a time-traveler. Signs, gas pumps, even an old car parked out front completed the scene. Best of all, it was an open antique shop filled with a lot of impressive automobilia. One great piece actually made it home into my collection of stuff. Best of all, it fit into the MG!

Signs indicating we were on Route 58 signaled the journey home had begun. But first – a lunch break at Berry Hill, a historic plantation turned into a superb meeting and convention center. Located about 25 miles from Virginia International Raceway, this historic and impressive mansion was one owned by Benjamin Harrison and is one of Virginia's finest examples of Greek Revival architecture. Delayed once by Hurricane Matthew, OA-5 was pushed back again by Hurricane Nicole, which caused slight damage to the launch tracking station in Bermuda.

As a note – these donations are not simply turned over to these families. As part of the self-sufficiency program, participants earn credits for their efforts, which translate into gift cards and used to purchase things their family needs.

Monthly Meeting Minutes October 4,2016

The car club's October meeting was held at the home of Bill and Renee Olcheski in Virginia Beach. At 8:05 PM President Robert Perrone called the meeting to order with a "thanks" to our hosts for opening their home to us. Robert asked if there were any new members or guests present, and we found that the club was graced with the presence of a new member, Mr. Durant Phillips, who has a '67 MGB GT.

Moving on with business, the minutes of the September meeting were voted to be approved as written, and the prez then called for the VP report. Tad Carter announced that, although there was skepticism regarding the size of a huge groundhog reported by Cynthia Faschini during the Crooked Road Tour, the validation of the Dipstick issue provided proof that the report was correct. Tad then revealed that he had returned to the scene and recovered said monster groundhog, and then presented Cynthia with the pelt of the creature! (Turns out it was a large groundhog hand puppet, possibly obtained from the "Caddyshack" movie.)

Jim Villers then provided the monthly detailed Treasurer's report: we started with \$2,538.96 and after receipts and disbursements have a balance of \$2,501.98. He noted that \$227.98 was spent on the annual printing of the club roster, and that anyone else who is willing to receive an electronic copy in lieu of a hard copy should let him know, in order to minimize that expense for the club. For the Activities update, Tad reported that during the recent Crooked Road Tour, the group drove a total of over 9,000 vehicle miles, over 17,000 "people miles", and noted that Garmin and Google maps did not always agree. For all those miles, there were no significant problem issues with our hardy MGs. Sadly, our Sylvan Heights Bird Park tour is canceled due to the anticipated bad weather associated with hurricane Matthew. The potential drive to Wallops Island to view a rocket launch is still on the table, with the most current information indicating it may be around October 13. Tad will send out an email if the "trigger is pulled" on that activity. Our Fall Tech Session will be on November 6, the annual Holiday party will be held December 10 at the home of PJ and Faith Peterson, and we'll be doing the traditional Holiday Lights drive to view the decorations at the Norfolk Botanical Gardens on December 13. Tad noted that there are still a few dates available to host monthly meetings; let him know if your home is available or you have suggestions.

No club history update for this meeting, but Susan Bond keeps the albums and history, and these are always available to the group. Mark Davidoski thanked the contributors for the recounts of Days One and Two of the Crooked Road Tour, and let the group know that the next Dipstick will contain the write-ups for Days Three and Four. Please send him an article for the Pungo Wings and Wheels event and the Waynesboro car show if you attend. David Kinsey reminded the group that items with the MG logo and/or Abingdon crest are available on line from Stitchworks. He also still has some T-shirts and other club logo items available.



Old Business – none. New Business: Jim Villers proposed that the club increase the reimbursement amount for people who host meetings, etc. to \$125.00, as the club has accumulated assets and the costs of hosting events has risen. A motion for this was made, seconded and approved, and Jim noted that the change will be effective "the next time he writes a check".

Cynthia's new friend

Marque Tyme discussion: Andy Wallach announced he has 'seen the light' in regard to the improved traveling comfort of the MGB Roadster as compared to the MGA and MGTs they've used for touring in the past. Robert Perrone discussed his issue with a bad road vibration that was chronic at the 60-65 mph speeds. He found that a fix of the steering rack damper on the rack and pinion steering corrected 80% of the problem. He also commented that lubrication in the front end is also important, and recommended 90W oil. There was additional discussion among the members regarding that a new damper or rebuilt front end can take up to a year to loosen up back to "normal" where the steering will automatically track back to driving straight ahead quickly. Mark Childers reminded the group to change out antifreeze for radiator protection, noting that it can look "clean and green" but be contaminated and rotting out the radiator. David Kinsey mentioned that during October 21-23 there will be vintage car racing scheduled at Dominion Raceway. Frank Worrell asked if anyone had parts or leads for a headlight switch for his '78 B Roadster; the original part was apparently soldered to the steering column and self-destructed, and he's having trouble getting it functioning the way he'd like.

Bill Yoshida reported that we currently have 109 paid members, 6 promises to renew, and 179 cars registered with TMGCCC, even though a few members have sold their MGs or moved. A copy of the 2017 Directory was emailed to members on September 30, and he had brought hard copies to the meeting for those who need them, in order to save postage costs. He will be sending out information on any Directory corrections or updates, so contact Bill if you find errors.

Our closing raffle included the 50/50 cash split, a very nice MG tool bag, a laminated poster for valve adjustment directions, a nicely framed wine tour picture, a large MG advertisement poster and the coveted First in Line for food. This last was a great prize due to the excellent spread of roast beef, cheeses, beercooked sausages and other delights provided by the Olcheski's. Prizes were awarded and the meeting was adjourned.


