

### **Activity Report – January 2018**

Well, there you have it. 2017 is in our rear-view mirror. One sixth of the new century is behind us. We saw everything from the humidity and triple-digit heat of SC in August to rain, sleet and snow, all in a matter of minutes, as we toured the Holiday Lights in December. We visited breweries, wineries, chip factories, museums, battlefields and street fairs. Our culinary travels took us to Cuba, Ireland, Philadelphia, Italy, Germany, the Mediterranean, as well as the back yards of America with burgers and hot dogs. We searched through antiques, traveled back in time to Colonial Williamsburg, Jefferson's Monticello and Woodstock. And we experienced the awe-inspiring total eclipse of the sun. Something for just about everyone. Thanks to all who joined us in our travels.

I know there are a few number junkies out there, so here's the wrap-up. Collectively, we traveled 32,595 car miles, and 54,750 passenger miles. We welcomed 44 different families at various events over the year, and 220 participants. A single person, participating in every event would have covered 2,667 miles. We had four families traveling over 4000 passenger miles, with our top travelers at 5,304 miles. Here's how that stacks up in a single trip: Leave Virginia Beach and travel to Sault Ste. Marie via Pittsburg and Detroit. Turn east and travel through Ottawa, Montreal, Quebec City and across the ferry to the Cabo Spear Lighthouse in St. John's Newfoundland – the eastern-most point in North America. Then turn around and head south, stopping for lobster in Maine, baked beans in Boston, a sandwich in Philly and then take a nap as you cross the Lewes-Cape May Ferry. Drive down the Eastern Shore and home to Virginia Beach. And that still leaves you 32 miles for side-trips. According to GoogleMaps, that is a 100-hour and 31-minute drive. Who's up for a road trip? And the winner of our 2017 Traveler Award is.....going to be announced at our January meeting.

If you were at the Holiday Party (THANK YOU TO JIM & BETTY for hosting!!!), you should have received the 2018 event schedule. I'll have them with me again throughout 2018, so let me know if you need a copy. Meetings are mostly scheduled, but we still have two openings – **Wednesday, March 7 and Tuesday, April 3**. Please raise your hand if you can host a meeting. Part of the unique character of this club is kicking tyres in the driveway prior to our monthly meetings. That is a little

less personal in a restaurant parking lot.

We do, however, have certain traditions which we will continue. Our first meeting of 2018 will be on **January 3<sup>rd</sup> at Frankie's Place for Ribs** in Virginia Beach. A long-time favorite, we are set to enjoy some great BBQ as we kick off the new year. If you are planning to eat dinner, shoot for a 6:00-6:30 arrival. The meeting will follow under the steady hand of President Olcheski.



There are two events planned for February. A TMGC event, we start with the appropriately named **Horrible Idea Tour on Saturday the 17**th. For those who still remember things, you will recall that the February drive has been our Brew Cruise for several years. For those who can't remember much, let me introduce you to the Brew Cruise. However, this is where we veer from tradition, and therefore, the source of the name. We will mix our beverages, starting with wine and moving on to beer and distilled spirits. It will be a mid-morning start from Waffle House (4800 Portsmouth Blvd, Chesapeake). For further info, I encourage you to renew your subscription to the Dipstick and check out the February edition.

The following weekend on Saturday the 24th, we have been invited to participate in the Central VA British Car Club Somewhat Annual Snowball **Run**. They are making a weekend of it. and we are invited to join in whenever and wherever we choose. Unless you make other plans, the starting point for us will be a late morning drive to Smithfield for lunch. The CVBCC convoy should arrive at about 11:30. Several restaurants. including Smithfield Station, Wharf Hill and Taste of Smithfield, are expecting participants, but you are free to do as



you wish and tour the town at your leisure. We'll depart Smithfield by 1:30 for a yet-to-be-determined route into Tidewater and the Cavalier Hotel in Virginia Beach. Well, I like the folks in the Tidewater MG club. Plus, my 1980 MGB has been a joy. Ah ha. Surely, the British make a bigger driving machine...Rolls Royce.



Where do you find a gently used vintage Rolls Royce in good cosmetic & mechanical condition at a fair price? Ebay and Florida of course!

In less than 24 hours I found the solution to my small car dilemma – a 1984 Rolls Royce Silver Spur. A consult with Frank Linse assured me this was a sound decision. Suddenly she was mine for the "Buy It Now Price". I became the 4<sup>th</sup> owner of this Mark I Spur with 53,000 miles (6,240 were produced from 1980-1988).

She is a BIG lady at 5,011 pounds dry weight. A 16 valve, 6.75 liter, 329 horsepower V8 engine propels her down the road (like an aircraft carrier). At 8 miles per gallon in the city the she requires a 30 gallon fuel tank! 8 quarts of oil lubricate the engine while the self-leveling suspension/braking system utilizes a special mineral oil.


